Young Dog in Care of ARL Needs Critical Surgery to Improve Quality of Life

Dog has torn knee ligament

A 1-year-old mixed-breed dog in the care of the Animal Rescue League of Boston (ARL) is looking to return to a pain-free life by receiving a critical surgery to repair a torn knee ligament.

The injury is a familiar one for sports fans, as the dog, named Ace, has a torn ACL, and is currently unable to run and play in a pain-free manner. He has been in the care of ARL for several months, and has been limited to bed rest in foster care as the organization has made preparations to help Ace get his groove back.

Because of the injury, his leg is painful, unstable, and he is unable to enjoy the active and playful life that every dog deserves. ARL offers the highest standards of care for every animal that comes through the organization's doors, however, Ace's surgery and post-operative care will be an expensive endeavor. The estimated cost of care is well over \$10,000, and ARL is seeking financial support from dog lovers who want to see Ace get back to the quality of life he deserves. Ace is scheduled to have the surgery completed in the next week.

Ace is incredibly friendly and affectionate, and ARL is looking forward to finding him the home he deserves once his recovery from surgery is complete.
